  - Follow-up: What might both sides have done differently to avoid violence?
- 5. \*\*The Battle of Golden Hill didn't result in a full-scale uprising, but it increased tensions between the colonists and British soldiers. How do you think events like this contributed to the start of the Revolutionary War?\*\*
  - Follow-up: Why is it important to understand the causes of conflicts in history?
