- 2. **What do you think Ebenezer Richardson could have done differently to avoid the situation that led to Christopher Seider's death?**
 - Follow-up: How could the protesters have handled their anger in a more peaceful way?
- 3. **The Rope Walk Incident started over a soldier looking for a job. Why do you think tensions were so high between British soldiers and Boston workers?**
- Follow-up: Can you think of modern examples where people feel like jobs are being unfairly taken away?
- 4. **How do events like the death of Christopher Seider and the Rope Walk fights show that tensions between colonists and British soldiers were escalating?**
- Follow-up: Do you think it was possible to stop the situation from becoming violent? Why or why not?
- 5. **Crispus Attucks, who may have participated in the Rope Walk Incident, later played a key role in the Boston Massacre. How do you think small events like this connect to bigger events in history?**
- Follow-up: Why is it important to study these smaller moments leading up to the Revolutionary War?
